Most workshops will be held on Fridays 3-4:30 pm, and we hope the series will reach from January 2023 through the summer 2024 conference—counting on so many of you whose lives, whose teaching, and whose students have been indelibly transformed by bell's luminous spirit, deep intellect, and fierce passion for transgressively transforming our world!

Send a 250 word abstract describing your connection to the theme and any writing/interactive activities you will include. Activities should comprise at least half of your 90-minute session. Please also include a 100 word bio and indicate preferred dates and any dates that won't work for you. Proposals due by Sunday, January 8, 2023 to aeplconf2023@gmail.com to be considered for the first round of Zoom presentations. Proposals received after that date will be considered for later rounds of sessions.

Send an approximately 250 word abstract and 100-word bio for a 90-minute Zoom session by Friday, January 6, 2023 to aeplconf2020@gmail.com.

Be sure to include descriptions of writing and interactive activities you will include, which should comprise at least half of your session.

Most Zoom sessions will take place Fridays 3-4:30 pm. So please indicate both any preferred dates and any dates that won't work for you.
